This took place to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet: Tell the daughter of Zion: Look, your King comes to you, humble, and riding on a donkey, a colt, the foal of a donkey. (Matthew 21:4,5 EHV)

YOUR KING CAME IN HUMILITY

Kings aren't usually acclaimed for being gentle. The most famous kings are known for their power, pomp, and prestige. They are hailed for their military victories and territorial expansion. They like to flex their power. Worldly leaders seldom boast of their humility.

But look at Jesus. How different this King is! He came to this earth in humility. He was born in a stable with a manger for his crib. He lived as a common carpenter's son. He lay his head wherever he was welcome.

On Palm Sunday his humility was again on display. Jesus didn't come with a sword leading an army. He rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, a beast of burden, in a procession comprised of common people. He did not resist riding into Jerusalem in such a humble procession or balk at what was about to happen to him that week. His betrayal, the trial, the thorns, the nails, and the cross—that was the cup his Father wanted him to drink, and he drank it willingly. He was passive to his Father's will. He allowed it all to happen.

This kind of rule was unexpected. That's why the Jewish leaders shouted "Crucify!" when they stood before Pontius Pilate. Do our shouts of praise ever shift to slander when Jesus is not what we expect, when he doesn't flex his muscles as we'd like? We may expect certain things in life: a good marriage, a healthy body, obedient children, nice possessions. But when things don't turn out the way we'd like, we mumble, "This isn't what I expected, Lord. I deserve better! Where is your kingly power in my life?"

In response to our sometimes misguided expectations, Jesus gave us something we truly could never have expected. Our King "did not come to serve, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). Jesus didn't come to amaze us with feats of earthly power; he came to save us from sin and guilt. He didn't come to rule with an iron fist and sword; he came to rule us by the message of his mercy and grace.

King Jesus, you came in obedience to your Father's will to suffer for the sins of the world. Help me to be humble before you, admit my sin, and rejoice in your forgiveness. Amen

#### **NORDIC CHURCH PROJECT UPDATE**

Hainesville Lutheran Church applied for and was accepted into the Nordic Church Project (NCP) which is under the auspices of Partners for Sacred Places (PSP). PSP is dedicated to bringing people together to maintain and utilize America's houses of worship. The NCP provides grant money to churches of Nordic heritage who are wanting to preserve/maintain their church. Two grants are available through NCP: a planning grant offering a 2:1 match up to \$5000 and a capital grant offering a 1:1 grant up to \$15,000.

In September, 2023, George Sincock, Bill and Sue Nusbaum and Pastor Mary Lou attended a conference held in Minnesota outlining the requirements of the grants. We learned that working with an architect or engineer knowledgeable about historic preservation is an asset to any building project and is strongly encouraged by NCP. Bill is in the process of searching for a person with the qualifications we need. We hope to use that person's expertise to develop a 25-year maintenance schedule for our church and grounds. Capital work projects the council has in mind are fortifying the window frame in readiness for the new stained-glass windows and maintenance of the steeple. George and Mary Lou have completed and submitted a planning grant application that would be used for the architect/engineer's fees. Please look for updates on this project as we move forward.

Keep in mind that the NCP requires us to be actively involved in the community in which our church is located and this includes providing fundraisers that draw the larger community into the restoration process. The Advent Concert held last December which raised money for the stained-glass windows is one example of fulfilling this requirement. The Car Show scheduled for June 15<sup>th</sup> also fulfills NCP's expectations. God has blessed us with being accepted into this project and we are blessed to be a blessing to the wider Nasewaupee community.

#### <u>"The Stranger in the Lifeboat"</u> by Mitch Albom (April book)

What would happen if we called on God for help and God actually appeared? In Mitch Albom's profound new novel of hope and faith, a group of shipwrecked passengers pull a strange man from the sea. He claims to be "the Lord." And he says he can only save them is they all believe in him.

Adrift in a raft after a deadly ship explosion, nine people struggle for survival at sea. Three days pass. Short of water, food, and hope they spot a man floating in the waves. They pull him in.

"Thank the Lord we found you," a passenger says. "I am the Lord," the man whispers.

So begins Mitch Albom's most beguiling and inspiring novel yet.

Albom has written of heaven in the celebrated number of bestsellers The Five People You Meet in Heaven and the First Phone Call from Heaven. Now, for the first time in his fiction, he ponders what we would do if, after crying out for divine help, God actually appeared before us? What might the Lord look, sound, and act like?

In The Stranger in the Lifeboat, Albom keeps us guessing until the end: Is this strange and quiet man really, sho he claims to be? What actually happened to cause the explosion? Ware the survivors already in heaven, or are they in hell? The story narrated by Benji, one of the passengers, who recounts the events in a notebook that is later discovered, a year later, when the empty life raft washes up on the island of Montserrat.

It falls to the island's chief inspector, Jarty LeFleur, a man battling his own demons, to solve the mystery of what really happened. A fast-paced, compelling novel that makes you ponder your deepest beliefs, The Stranger in the Lifeboat suggests that answers to our prayers may be found where we least expect them.


