
The Light of Christ



Meeting adjourned at 7:20 Closed with prayer. Next meeting: 1/15/18 Kim Heindl (Council Secretary)


Happenings this winter!

Reading resolutions

Every January, many Christians resolve to read the entire Bible in one year. That's a worthy goal, but God doesn't require us to read a certain number of verses or chapters per day. Instead, he tells us to simply be in his Word — and thus be with him - so he can grow our faith, light our path and assure us of his love and forgiveness. God's Word is a precious gift, but we need to "unwrap" it!

F.B. Meyer offers this helpful advice for a new year of discovering (and rediscovering!) Scripture: "Read the Bible, not as a newspaper, but as a home letter. If a cluster of heavenly fruit hangs within reach, gather it. If a promise lies upon the page as a blank check, cash it. If a prayer is recorded, appropriate it and launch it as a feathered arrow from the bow of your desire. If an example of holiness gleams before you, ask God to do as much for you. If the truth is revealed ... entreat that its

brilliance may ever irradiate your life."

The book to be reading for February is titled "Being Mortal: Medicine Books Belief and what matters in the end" by Atul Gawande. The author tackles the

hardest challenge of his profession: how medicine can not only improve life but also the process of its ending.

Lessons in wise faith

"The Magi teach us true faith," said Martin Luther. Given the obstacles they encountered, we would understand if they had given up altogether!

First, the travelers were "off the mark," coming to Jerusalem to seek a newborn king in a "royal palace." Then, directed to Bethlehem, the wise men found a sight "so utterly out of keeping with a king" — a poor young woman and child, in a "poor hut" — that one might expect them to head straight home. "But," declares Luther, "with a great, strong and full faith they ... follow the word of the prophet and the witness of the star in all purity of heart," bowing to worship and honor the Savior.

January 6, 2019

Jesus' birth is for all the world

Hymn of the Week: The First Noel

Caring Conversations: Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal

reflections

What is the furthest you've ever traveled from home?

What have you learned by traveling from home?

 In the story of the wise men form the East coming to pay homage to baby Jesus, God is announcing that in God's son, salvation is brought to all. How does God's action in Jesus help you look at and appreciate different customs and cultures you have seen?

Devotions: Read Ephesians 3: 1-12

This passage lifts up the important themes for Epiphany Day. The Apostle Paul expresses humility at being included in God's plan of salvation, a plan that includes the Gentiles, therefore, all people of the earth. Just as the wise men form the East represent those people not from Israel, so God's love reached far beyond any national boundary. For foreign wise men to follow a star and reach Bethlehem, too, represents the greater mystery of God's work in a little one born to a peasant family to be worshiped by the rulers of the earth. The visit of the wise men changes everything. Strangers become family. Rulers are humbled. The humble are exalted, and through the birth of Jesus. God's love reaches the ends of the world. Think about ways you have seen God's love reaching the ends of the earth today.

Pray: God of the nations, you unite all the people of the earth through your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Help us to recognize in the face of others your saving work for all people. Give us hearts to share the mystery of your will and prove your love with all that you have made through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Service:

In Matthew 2:9-11, the wise men followed a star and "when they saw the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy." They entered the house where the star stopped and saw Mary and the child. They knelt, honored, and worshipped Jesus and gave him gifts. God guided the wise men to Jesus with a star. What guides you to Jesus today? Name ways you can be "a star" to guide others to Jesus through your actions and words.

Rituals and traditions:

Epiphany is an older tradition than Christmas for recognizing the birth of Jesus. Many places around the globe have some form of a Three Kings' Cake, an Epiphany cake or bread that is made to celebrate the visit of the wise men and honor Christs' birth. Buy or make a Three Kings' Cake or bread and enjoy this treat as part of your Epiphany Day celebrations.

Beginning in Advent, we started something new. There has been a weekly insert for you to take home that is a resource for a daily devotional and time to have "caring conversations" within your household. There are Bible readings, a scripture verse to memorize each week, meal time prayers, suggestions for service opportunities, caring conversation starters, and a devotion. This resource is to be used as a way to keep our conversations going each day about seeing God active in our daily lives, our community and our world. Let us start a new spiritual practice of faith conversations in our homes as we live out an active faith in our daily lives.

Give us the power to be receptive, to take the newness you give There is a time to be born, and it is now. We sense the pangs and groans of your newness. Come here now in the name of Jesus. Amen.


