
Peace and Love, Pastor Trent

My father died 18 years ago today.

And in many ways, I'm glad he is gone. We miss him every day. But I would not want him to see what has happened to the world he loved. The organization he spent his life building up is now bankrupt in ways that are more than financial.

The country he loved is torn apart and flounders to be civil in even the most fundamental kindnesses. Conversations are riddled with profanities, with contempt, with little patience and compassion, and with no desire to listen deeply to those who hold different opinions.

I ache for our world. There is pain and suffering of 180,000 American families that have had to endure a death because of COVID-19. There is a weariness to the very depths of our souls for the things

And there is confusion, and anger, and contempt and fear that does not go away, even for a nanosecond. My mind tries to tell me that this season is temporary, that there will be an end, there will be a way through, but for the moment, I am empty of hope.

I need to sit with my own anguish for a while and name the fact that I am in a season of lament. The Bible acknowledges

this is a very real part of being human. The Psalms of lament cry out to God in their pain and sorrow. There's even a whole book of the Bible that is named "Lamentations". Not every psalm paints a rosy picture. Not every psalm is filled with praise. But every psalm acknowledges God. Every psalm assumes that God is listening and that God is still God and creator and sustainer of all.

There are immediate things that I am struggling with. There is a real sorrow and sadness that seems to accompany me every moment. Family members are hurting, friends are struggling, our community and state is in turmoil, but I KNOW THAT MY REDEEMER LIVES.

This I can cling to. I am not abandoned by God. I may not know how to help but I know WHO I can depend on. God sustains me. God holds me in the palm of His hand. God whispers His love for me into my emptiness. I am loved and I am treasured and I am worth dying for. And He loves you that deeply as well.

Present: Pastor Trent, Jim Vogel, Marie Weber, Rick Hannemann, Linda Monahan, Bonnie Kohn, Ellen Klister, April Mascorro

Absent: Gene LaPlante, Frank Pudlo, John Melland Opening prayer: Call to order by Jim Vogel at 6:05pm. Due to COVID-19, Stay at Home order, council met today, via ZOOM (video conferencing application).

COVID-19 Task Force provided materials via email to council regarding an outdoor service and a drive-in (parking lot) service. Council determined outdoor services will be tabled at this time. **Drive-in (parking lot) service was approved by council with a few modifications to the procedure provided.** Motion by Bonnie, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Rick.

Modifications include:

- 1) Both school and north entrance will be blocked
- 2) Pastor Trent will ring the church bell

Life is suddenly full of drama for low-key Harley Jackson: A woman in a big red pickup has stolen his bachelor's heart, a Hummer-driving predatory developer is threatening to pave the last vestiges of his family farm, and inside his barn is a calf bearing the image of Jesus Christ. His best friend, Billy, a giant of a man who shares his trailer house with a herd of cats and tries to pass off country music lyrics as philosophy, urges him to avoid the woman, fight the developer, and get rich off the calf. But Harley takes the opposite tack, hoping to avoid what his devout, dearly departed mother would have called "a scene."

Then the secret gets out—right through the barn door, and Harley's "miracle" goes viral. Within hours pilgrims, grifters, and the media have descended on his quiet patch of Swivel, Wisconsin, looking for a glimpse (and a percentage) of the calf. Does Harley hide the famous, possibly holy calf and risk a riot, or give the people what they want—and raise enough money to keep his land—and, just possibly, win the woman and her big red pickup truck?

Harley goes all in, cutting a deal with a major Hollywood agent that transforms his little farm into an international spiritual theme park—think Lourdes, only with cheese curds and t-shirts. Soon, Harley has lots of money . . . and more trouble than he ever dreamed.




### **Optimism grounded in hope**



"I am fundamentally an optimist," said anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela. "Part of being optimistic is keeping one's head pointed toward the sun, one's feet moving forward. There were many dark moments when my faith in humanity was sorely tested, but I would not and could not give myself up to despair.."

Some say optimism is naïve, "a generic good idea about the future" (Walter Brueggemann, *Reverberations of Faith*), and distinguish it from hope. But Mandela's 27 years in prison and other sufferings would indicate that, in his case, optimism is anchored in deep hope.

Our hope is grounded in God's power to bring life from death, primarily in Jesus' resurrection, and in other acts of deliverance. God brings joy from sorrow, healing from brokenness, love from hate. We can't fathom what goodness awaits us down the road (Could Mandela, in prison, imagine becoming South Africa's first black president?!), so we keep looking up and moving forward. Such optimism is rooted in profound hope — and is a gift of God.

# All Workers are Essential—According to Martin Luther

The concept of vocation, Latin for "to call," previously referred only to a calling to church work. But then Martin Luther emphasized the importance — and even sanctity — of *all* types of labors. The reformer pointed out that "God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbor does."

RJ Grunewald, in a blog post titled "God Makes Pizza," describes how this looks today: "God is busy about *his* work in the midst of *your* work whether you realize it or not. The laundry, the spreadsheets, the phone calls and the cups of coffee are all deeply spiritual because God is at work in the world. He is serving your family, your coworkers and your community through the work you do. God is at work providing 'daily bread' through the work that you do, no matter what that work is."
