LOOK HOW HAPPY THEY ARE

Have you ever heard of the law of the farm? It is simply this: You reap what you sow. If you plant potatoes, you are going to get potatoes.

Sow criticism into a marriage, anger into a childhood, lies into a friendship, sexual immorality into life, and stand back to learn the law of the farm. The critical marriage winds up loveless, the merciless parent fails, forgiveness is hard to come by, the liar can't be trusted, and the promiscuous person can't find real love in life. It brings tears. We are not always happy, because of our sin.

The worst part is that it does not just result in a harvest of pain, guilt, anger, and sadness. Our sin would have resulted in a harvest of hell. Eternal separation from God. But God reaped what we sowed. He sent Jesus, the Lamb of God, to suffer our harvest of hell on the cross so that we would win his harvest in heaven. In this life we have joy in knowing that perfect happiness awaits us in heaven because of Jesus. For now, we are not always happy because we live in a world suffering sin's effect. For now, we have tears.

It's why it is so important to see the perfect happiness of heaven that John describes. God's goal is to rescue us form this world of tears and bring us into happiness of heaven. I don't know how exactly, but he will even use those tears to keep you close to him.

Have you ever been in a town with a Glockenspiel, or "playing bells"? When you are right next to it, the bells sound harsh and dissonant. But when you hear them from a distance, you can hear the harmonious tune. That is like the tears of life. They seem harsh and cruel now, but in heaven God will reveal how he was making harmonious music in our lives. Today, loot at the saints in heaven. Look how happy they are as they worship before the Lamb.

Book choice: "The Life She Was Given" by Ellen Marie Wiseman

From acclaimed author Ellen Marie Wiseman comes a vivid, daring novel about the devastating power of family secretsbeginning in the poignant, lurid world of a Depression-era traveling circus and coming full circle in the transformative 1950's. On a summer evening in 1931, Lily Blackwood glimpses circus lights from the grimy window of her attic bedroom, Lilly isn't allowed to explore her attic bedroom. Lilly isn't allowed to explore the meadows around Blackwood Manor. She's never even ventured beyond her narrow room. Momma insists it's for Lilly's own protection, that people would be afraid if they saw her. More than two decades later, nineteen -year-old Julia Blackwood has inherited her parents' estate and horse farm. Instead, she becomes immersed in a mystery involving a hidden attic room and photos of circus scenes featuring a striking young girl.

At first, The Barlow Brother's Circus is just another prison for Lilly. But in this rag-tag, sometimes brutal world, Lilly discovers strength, friendship, and a rare affinity for animals. Soon, thanks to elephants Pepper and JoJo and their handler, Cole, Lilly is no longer a sideshow spectacle but the circus's biggest attraction...until tragedy and cruelty collide. It will fall to Julia to learn the truth about Lilly's fate and her family's shocking betrayal, and find a way to make Blackwood Manor into a place of healing at last.

Moving between Julia and Lily's stories, Ellen Marie Wiseman portrays two extraordinary, very different women in a novel that, while tender and heartbreaking, offers moments of joy and indomitable hope.
